Preparing for the Lent 3

In order to be prepared to hear the Scripture on Sunday, we will be offering introductions to the lessons. (Perhaps this preparation will allow for Bible Study following Coffee hour in January 2023!)

Scripture

Exodus 17:1-7, This is the second story about thirst and water in Exodus (see also 15:22-27). For people living in an arid land, thirst was a powerful metaphor for a human's need for God. Moses now uses the staff that made the Nile foul to bring fourth clean water. Israel's murmuring is a constant feature of the Exodus narratives. This incident at Massah (meaning "test") and Meribah (meaning "quarrel") became a byword for Israel's faithlessness.

Psalm 95, This psalm, like Psalm 81, outlines a liturgy celebrating God's kingship. It was probably used at the great autumnal New Year's festival. The first section (vv. 1-7a) is a processional hymn in two parts. One part is sung in the temple court, praising God as Creator (vv. 1-5), and the other marks the entry into the sanctuary, praising God as Lord of the covenant people. In the second section of the psalm (vv. 7b-11), the people are cautioned against repeating the disobedience and faithlessness of their ancestors.

Romans 5:1-11, Paul uses two metaphors to describe God's redeeming act in Christ: justification, the end of a legal dispute, and reconciliation, the termination of a state of enmity. Christ sacrifice demonstrates God's justifying, reconciling love for us. The work of salvation was begun in Christ's ministry, death, and resurrection and is now operative through he Holy Spirit. Whereas justification marks the beginning of this process, salvation marks its future completion. We enter more fully into salvation by participating in Christ's risen life and by anticipating a share in God's glory.

John 4:5-42, This is the second discourse in John on the meaning of Jesus as the revelation of God. The Samaritans were descendants of the peoples settled by the Assyrians in the northern area after the fall of Israel (721 $_{BCE}$). These early settlers worshiped other gods as well as Yahweh. After the Jews returned from exile, enmity with the Samarians developed and persisted. Though later the Samaritans worshiped Yahweh alone, they had their one center of worship on Mount Gerizim. The woman first recognized Jesus as the Prophet-like-Moses, the figure in whom the Samarians centered their messianic expectations. She brings up the dispute over the proper place of worship, but Jesus' answers focuses on the important issue-on the response to God's gift of life. Jesus' reply finally invites the woman to acknowledge him as the Messiah.

Universal Background Checks, Safe Storage and Extreme Risk Protection Order bills are in State House and Senate hearings again this week.

The State House Judiciary will meet Wednesday and are expected to vote the Gun Safety bills out of committee. The State Senate Judiciary will meet Thursday and are expected to vote the Gun Safety bills out of committee.

The floor votes are expected to be next week. That means that next week we could have bills with a vote in the House and Senate and to the Governor to sign. New polling last week shows Michigan remains committed in the 90% to having common sense gun laws.

Gabby Giffords will be at the state capitol next week. It will be worth seeing this all happen if you can make it. Finally, a huge thank you for your support and efforts in all this. We have a long way to go in this work but this really feels like a moment!

RALLY WITH GABBY GIFFORDS IN LANSING MARCH 15!

<u>Please join us in Lansing at the Capitol on March 15th for a major rally</u>. The event will be headlined by <u>Gabby Giffords</u>, the former member of congress who survived an assassination attempt and has gone on to become one of our nation's leading voices against gun violence. 

Did you know? (Episcopal 101) About the Season of Lent?

"Dear People of God: The first Christians observed with great devotion the days of our Lord's passion and resurrection, and it became the custom of the Church to prepare for them by a season of penitence and fasting. This season of Lent provided a time in which converts to the faith were prepared for Holy Baptism. It was also a time when those who, because of notorious sins, had been separated from the body of the faithful were reconciled by penitence and forgiveness, and restored to the fellowship of the Church. Thereby, the whole congregation was put in mind of the message of pardon and absolution set forth in the Gospel of our Savior, and of the need which all Christians continually have to renew their repentance and faith.

I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word. And, to make a right beginning of repentance." *BCP p. 264-65*

The season now known as Lent (from an Old English word meaning "spring," the time of lengthening of days) has a long history. Early Christians observed "a season of penitence and fasting" in preparation for the Paschal (*Passover*) feast. Originally, in places were *Pascha* was celebrated on a Sunday, two days of fasting preceded it. Eventually the fasting became attached to 40 days, in imitation of Christ's fasting in the wilderness. This was of particular important to those mentioned in the BCP invitation above. For Episcopalians, Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and runs through Holy Saturday (Easter Eve) with the exception of Sundays. Rest in Peace Bishop Griswold

The Most Rev. Frank Tracy Griswold III, who served as the 25th presiding bishop of The Episcopal Church from 1998-2006, died Sunday, March 5, 2023, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, at the age of 85.

Bishop Griswold died Sunday, March 5, 2023, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. A renowned preacher known for his warmth and wit, Griswold served as the 25th presiding bishop of The Episcopal Church, leading the Protestant denomination from 1998 to 2006. Griswold also co-chaired the Roman Catholic-Anglican Commission from 1998 to 2003 and made significant contributions to the 1979 Book of Common Prayer and to its practical use in the liturgical life of the church.

Griswold's private spiritual practice was deeply informed by the early

mothers and fathers of the church, and he championed Eastern traditions of the open-hearted and healing power of God's love.

Born in Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania, in 1937, Griswold earned a Bachelor of Arts at Harvard College and a Master of Arts from Oriel College at the University of Oxford. He was ordained as an Episcopal priest in 1963. He married his beloved wife, Phoebe Wetzel, in 1965, and they raised two daughters in Philadelphia and Chicago, where Griswold was elected as Episcopal bishop in 1987.

Griswold practiced a wide ministry of teaching, writing, lecturing, and leading retreats, nationally and internationally. After completing his term as presiding bishop, he served as a visiting professor at seminaries and universities in South Korea, Cuba, and Japan, as well as at the Episcopal Divinity School, the Church Divinity School of the Pacific, Virginia Theological Seminary and Seabury-Western Theological Seminary. He also served as bishop visitor to the Society of St. John the Evangelist. His books include "Going Home" (Cowley Publications Cloister Book), "Praying our Days: A guide and companion" (Church Publishing Group), "Tracking Down the Holy Ghost: reflections on love and longing" (Church Publishing Group), and, co-authored with the Rev. Mark McIntosh, "Seeds and Faith" and "Harvest of Hope" (Eerdmans).

He is survived by his widow, Phoebe, his two daughters, Hannah and Eliza, and three grandchildren.
